Outgoing Chairman's Address to Convention

A dhaoine uaisle tá fáilte romhaibh uilig chuig Comhdhail Cinn Bliana Laighean inniu in Óstan Mount Wolseley.

I would like to thank Carlow County Board on their invitation to hold our convention here this afternoon, on what is a historic day for the county with the first ever Carlow man taking up the position of Chairman of Leinster. Dublin are to be congratulated on their winning both National football titles. Meath are fast becoming a Hurling County. Their U21A hurlers had a great success in the All-Ireland final in Thurles last September and having the opportunity to celebrate the winning of Christy Ring twice. Well done to all who represented us at national level.

Infrastructure

Great progress has been made to push on improvements in Infrastructure. However, a number of costly projects still remain to be completed and it is time some balance comes into the distribution of funds centrally. Well done to Offaly and Laois on the progress made with their training centres this year.

I would like to acknowledge the club grants funding that we receive from Croke Park. A big thank you is due to the development officers within our Counties for the work they do in supervising the spending of these funds. I would like to thank Derek Kent and our Infrastructure Committee for the selfless work in advising both clubs and counties on the best approach to be taken with their projects. Health and Safety is an area of great concern in terms of monies being wasted in dealing with claims that could easily be avoided. I feel the appointment of three professionals, from within our own volunteer structure, in this area has proven hugely beneficial and I would like to thank Michael O'Toole, Aidan O'Connor and PJ Kelly for their work on our behalf.

East Leinster Project

I reflected recently on a previous annual report booklet where a respected GAA official recalled Peig Sawyers and the practice of 'ag bothantaíocht'. Michael Delaney was referring to the Urbanisation of East Leinster and the lack of action in trying to address this issue. Well Michael, we have made considerable progress in this area in the last year.

In an attempt to close the obvious gaps, we made a proposal to management in Croke Park that an increase in funding into a four county region in the province would be a great help. This was accepted and as a result a fund of 500K per year for 3 years is being put in place. This was funded by 300K from central funds and 200k from Dublin's budget. The first of these appointments of a new coach occurred in Dunboyne, to which the club make a contribution to the cost themselves. This, I feel, will have a huge impact on improving our performance on the ground in the East Leinster region. Other areas in the province will not suffer as their positions will be under constant scrutiny in relation to their needs.

The 'ag bothantaíocht' term meant moving from house to house and I feel Michael meant we should not let borders stand in the way of progress. Well Michael, we have also addressed that issue as today sees the start of our cross-county competitions in which over 160 clubs fielding over 310 teams in under 13 and 15 hurling and football competitions. It was a promise I made the day I took up the position of chairman and I am delighted to have got it over the line just as I finish. I honestly believe that it is games programmes that improve standards and not endless training with cones and hopefully the benefits will be seen in time.

I would like to thank the various Coiste Na nOg's for their help, in arranging their schedules to facilitate this initiative. In particular, credit is due to Liam O'Neill who is overseeing both of these projects. Liam would acknowledge the huge workload that was involved and was ably undertaken by Shane Flanagan, Alan Mulhall and James Devane in particular.

PR and Marketing

This area of our operation has blossomed with the arrival of Cian Murphy on the scene. The remarketing of ourselves has been very productive. We have a new contract with Bord na Móna, this time in writing, which is worth a 40% increase to us as well as they taking on board the launch costs. Our second level schools have also got a new sponsor which is the first we have had in a long time. Top Oil monies have been used to distribute equipment to all our schools. There is also another new sponsor lined up - the logistics of which are being tied up and with clubs in the province being the beneficiaries. The coverage we are getting on social media has improved considerably and this is due to the work of Cian and Brendan Minnock.

I would like to thank our outgoing PRO Pat Teehan and his committee for all their work throughout the year. I would also like to wish Martin O'Halloran from Meath the best of luck in his new role as PRO. Michael Delaney dropped it at his retirement function that Meath was the only county not to have an officer to have served with him in his 39yrs. That in-balance is being somewhat corrected here today.

Finances

We have had a difficult time in relation to our income from our gates, with large drops in attendance at our football finals as well as a clash with international soccer and the Bruce Springsteen concerts. But taking all these factors into account, due to the prudent management of

our operation we have been able to maintain services at the same level and improve them in some cases. Our deficit is small and when you take two financial adjustments into account we have done very well. I would like to thank Syl, the finance committee and John Browne for keeping us in such good shape despite the difficulties.

Referees

Always an area open to negative comment to be thrown at, but the work being done by Tomás Quigley and his team is much appreciated. I recently attended a National Referees night in Croke Park at which medals were presented to those that had handled national finals and it was with pride I watched our provinces dominate the ceremony. To that end I would like to thank Tomas, Pierce Freaney, Noel O'Donoghue, Aidan Shields and Donal Smith for their work in recruiting and training.

Overseas

I am delighted to welcome our friends from Europe here today. This year has been a good year between ourselves and Europe with the putting together of a Strategic Plan and an application to the EU for funding. We have also put them in touch with a potential sponsor. The GAA family overseas has proven a great help to emigrants when they arrive first. The work done in promoting our games in Europe, The Middle East and Australasia is to be commended. We will continue to support this work as those involved have to cover all their own expenses.

Scór

Scór is very strong in certain parts of the province but could be worked on a lot harder in others. It gives a great opportunity to expose our membership to our Irish Culture, particularly during the winter break when little happens on the pitch.

GPA/CPA

I was personally involved in the recent GPA negotiations. I view it as a compliment to be trusted to act on behalf of the Association in such sensitive matters. The deal concluded imposed no extra cost on counties and the recent increase in costs for players equipment was independent of the deal. The arrival of the CPA initially highlighted a lot of issues that I feel we were well aware of. But do we need lobby groups in our organisation which I feel is very democratic in its nature. Some of the recent language used by this group concerns me.

DRA And Discipline In General

We as a Council find ourselves again having to take a National Committee to the DRA. The workshops at National and Provincial that were conducted after our previous case don't seem to have penetrated enough. I would like to thank Dick Butler, John Byrne and the Committee for their diligence in carrying out a difficult task. The educational work that this group have taken on has to be commended as this solves a lot of problems at source and gives a more consistent form of discipline within the organisation.

Equalisation

There has been a large amount of comment in relation to the different standards in Counties. I alluded last year to the need for equalisation of funding to be given to those counties who find it hard to raise capital. I feel this matter needs addressing as a lot of energy is expended in these counties struggling to manage their finances and distracting away from the main purpose of this organisation promoting games. Taking monies away from counties will be divisive - but allocating funds from new revenue streams to the weaker would be a great help. However, if this is to happen it must be subject to an acceptance of a greater governance. Sponsorship is also difficult for some counties in terms of the sums they receive. A common sponsor negotiated at national level might improve the situation with a number of counties being signed up to the same sponsor.

Jim Taking Office

Today is a very special day for our Vice-Chairman Jim Bolger, his wife Vera and children Kate, Shane and Ross. It is also special for Jim's club Clonmore and Carlow. Jim has given long service to Leinster Council in numerous areas but in particular Infrastructure and Coaching and Games. I have worked with Jim as a fellow officer for the last four years and found him to be both loyal and supportive with the best interests of Leinster at heart. Jim, I have no doubts you will make a great chairman and Leinster's affairs are in good hands and can I wish you the best of luck.

Áras Laighean Staff

The continued loyalty and efforts of our staff in Áras Laighean is greatly appreciated. The benefit of their experience has always been a great help to both the clubs and counties within the province. To Michael Reynolds, please accept my thanks on behalf of all your team.

Today brings an end to my term as Chairman of Leinster Council and I can honestly say it has been a very enjoyable and satisfying experience. Both I and my Family: Paula, Jack and my travel companion and wing man Liam are extremely grateful for the welcome and courtesy shown to us over the three years at functions and matches.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the members of our sub committees for their work throughout the year, without exception I feel you all have delivered a great years work.

To my management committee for your support and advice - thank you. Our meetings have always been open and frank in debate and I feel this has led to our getting decisions made in an informed manner.

To my fellow officers over the past three years Jim, Syl, John Greene and Pat a sincere thank you for your support and commitment throughout my time as Chairman.

Incoming Chairman's Address to Convention

A lar Chahaoireacha, a theachtaí ó Chontaetha Laighean agus a chaire Laighean go léir. Is cúis bróid dom a bheith mar chaitheoir Laighean. Is lá spesialta é do mo chlainn, do mo chlub Cluainmhór agus ar mo chontae.

To have this high office bestowed on me here today is truly a great honour and is indeed a privilege. To become the 34th Chairman of Leinster GAA didn't happen by accident and in this regard I owe a huge debt of gratitude to many.

Firstly on a personal level I wish to thank my wife Vera and my three children Kate, Shane and Ross for the latitude afforded to me over the years. The term 'absentee husband and father' is very apt, as I am sure it is also applicable for many of you present here today as well. It is great to have my two sisters Ann and Nuala here and I would like to thank them for all their support along my journey.

We have the Chairman from Gaelic Games Europe, Brian Sheedy, here today and I extend a warm welcome to him as well.

To my club, Clonmore, this is also a special day for us. The love of our games and all matters GAA were nurtured and honed by my club and, by extension, my community throughout my formative years. Special people in my life in this regard were, firstly, my late parents Liam and Nuala, my very dear uncle who I am delighted to say is with us here today – Eddie Forde, great mentor, coach and trainer. The late Sean O'Toole and many other coaches, administrators, and players too numerous to mention who gave selflessly to the cause. Additionally, I would like to mention our recently deceased honorary president Denis Cullen, a great friend of mine and of our club. All of these people helped to light a fire inside me, a love of the GAA that is hard to explain or put into words but it is safe to say that the GAA is seared in my soul and will I believe remain so until I take my last breath.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our Chairman, James Doyle, and Secretary, Clive Lambe. James is a grandson of one of our founding members so in that regard the link and tradition continues. Traditions like this are replicated up and down the length and breadth of the country which I believe is one of our great strengths.

Growing up in Hacketstown I, like any other child, looked forward to going home after a 'hard day' in school but especially so on a Monday as I just couldn't wait to see our beautiful red and green club jerseys dancing in the wind on Doyle's clothesline. Seeing those jerseys from the window of our kitchen made me dream of one day filling those big jerseys and representing my club with pride and passion. Of course, you know the best thing about those dreams was we won every one of those matches and I usually played a stormer as well!

Back in the 70's my Grandfather who ran a small pub in the town - luckily, for me, bought a colour television (colour TV's were rare enough at the time). Sundays, when there were matches on, I couldn't wait for 'Holy Hour' - that is the closure of the pub from 2-4 to kick in, because it was then that I had the TV to myself and the best stool in the house. Feasting on Kilkenny versus Cork in hurling and the Dublins and Offalys versus Kerry in the football was for me the best way to spend a Sunday afternoon. That time also had a profound effect on me relative to my GAA aspirations.

Today is also a special day for my County – Carlow. As many of you may be aware I have the distinction of being the first Carlow man to take up this prestigious post. However, I am especially lucky to be the first Carlow person to be awarded this honour as back in 1976 we had a very fine gentleman and a very fine administrator in the guise of the late Luke Hickey of Palatine, who served as Leinster vice-chairman. Luke was due to take up the post of Chairperson but, alas, faith intervened when his brother tragically lost his life in a workplace accident. Luke had to put his GAA commitments to one side and take over the family farm – doing the right thing for his family which was most admirable and I acknowledge him for that.

To the County Board Officers and operations manager Ronan Dempsey, I wish to thank you for all the support. In particular, I would like to mention the current County Chairman Sean Campion as I served with Sean when I was first on the Leinster Council. Also worthy of mention are his predecessors Michael Meaney, Pat Deering and Eddie Byrne. Eddie is a current Leinster Council delegate along with Liam Barry and both continue to be excellent ambassadors for our County. As previously also were Michael Whelan and Pat Nolan. It is also fitting that I mention and acknowledge the support from former secretaries Ger Lennon and the long-serving late Tommy O'Neill as well.

My playing days with Clonmore led to county selection and, luckily, I went on to play at all levels for my beloved county. However, it was the first time I was selected that stands out for me. My uncle Eddie, after arriving back from a Coiste na nÓg meeting on a Wednesday night, woke me up by tapping on my bedroom window. (There was no twitter in those days!) It was around midnight and he informed that I was selected at midfield for the County U-14's on Saturday (by the way I am still the same height). All that ensured with the excitement involved was that I didn't sleep for three nights as I was playing the match over and over in my mind and trying to decide was I going to play like Brian Mullins or Jack O'Shea. In the end, I played like neither, too tired I suppose, as we lost to a fine team from my nearest neighbours Wicklow.

In Tullow Community School, just down the road, I encountered a teacher, a Mayo man, a true GAA gentleman, the late Páraic Cunnane and was lucky enough to win two Leinster school titles under his hand. The time and effort Páraic and his 'ilk' put in to GAA games to many went unnoticed and it is only when that commitment stops through retirement for example, that we truly appreciate what went in to it as standards can very quickly drop or even diminish. His legacy is on record for all to see.

Clonmore is a football club and to satisfy my desire to play hurling I crossed the border into Wicklow to train and play with Kiltegan for a short while. While the sight of a young man with a hurley in my home town was a little unusual people got used to me hitching or cycling with my hurley. Under the watchful eye of the late, great Peter Keogh he ensured that I only played in challenge matches as we all know the county border is sacrosanct and anyone that knew Peter knows that he would uphold all rules.

My first experience of coaching came back in the late seventies when helping my uncle with our U-12's. Little did I know that this would lead to inter-county coaching at U-21 and senior levels. Life and work took me to many different places leading to my connections with both Ballyboden St. Enda's and Killeshin GAA clubs. The GAA connection was a great ice breaker for me in these communities and I quickly made many friends and got involved coaching. In my experience no one has a monopoly on pride and passion, love of our games or hard work but when it all comes together it is amazing what can be achieved.

When I stepped back from my involvement with coaching and management I decided to give the admin side of the house a go. In this regard the experience I have gained from my involvement in numerous committees at county, provincial and central level, allied to my professional relevant experience will I believe stand me in good stead relative to my new role.

Replacing John Horan requires filling big shoes and I mean that both in the literal and metaphoric sense. Over time and particularly over the last 3 years I have watched and learned from John. John's advice, support and guidance were ever present and I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank John in this regard. In addition, I wish John, his wife Paula, sons Jack and Liam the very best in the future. Something tells me we may be hearing more from John in a GAA context in the not too distant future.

To all the Leinster Council Officers I served with a hearty thank you - I would especially like to thank Syl Merrins, Pat Teehan and of course our Chief Executive Michael Reynolds, additionally I would like to mention his long-serving predecessor Michael Delaney who was very supportive to me from the outset. To the two other Chairmen I served under, Seamus Howlin and Martin Skelly, sincere thanks as it was great to learn from you both.

It is time for me now to congratulate Pat Teehan on becoming vice-chairman and I am looking forward to working with Pat once again. Pat has a wide breadth of experience that will be very beneficial to us. Commiserations to Syl and Conor and I am sure that they will continue to play important roles within or association in future in keeping with their commitment to date. Putting yourself forward for selection is a brave thing to do and I commend you for that.

I would also like to congratulate our new Treasurer Pat Lynagh. Pat has a very good handle on all matters GAA and will add a lot of value to Comhairle Laighean in his new role.

Congratulations to our new PRO Martin Halloran and best wishes to you in the role. Martin, this is a role that you will relish as you are fulfilling a dream and really enjoy this type of work.

In relation to the future there are always challenges. Areas of particular interest to me are player welfare including mental health, the threat to or plight of rural or smaller clubs given the diminishing player numbers, conversely the dearth of adequate facilities to cater for the larger numbers presenting at urban clubs. We cannot look at either end of the spectrum in isolation. Meaningful fixture programmes that are 'fit for purpose', for example the recent initiatives on cross border games programmes, allied to the continued roll-out of our mandatory coaching standards should serve to address many of the issues presented.

Refereeing always presents challenges, notwithstanding the positive position of Leinster Referees on the national stage at present - the worry is the difficulty of recruiting and then retaining new referees to fill the void after the current cohort have had their time and I feel we have to be inventive in this regard.

Many of our volunteers for example, County and Club Chairmen become pre-occupied with finance and fundraising and this is an issue that can detract from their other roles and responsibilities. Many of our units throughout the province have had difficulty in filling officer positions in recent times. To help to ensure the future of our units we will place a strong emphasis on club and county officer training and our support resources will be available as appropriate.



When looking at policy decisions or new initiatives I am always mindful of the grass roots volunteer. This is the heart and soul person who gives all for their club all their lives. Consideration has to be given to the impact particularly adverse impact our decisions may have on this person. As long as we keep that person in mind I don't think we will go too far wrong.

Together, we will face, and deal with, the aforementioned challenges. Our excellent, dedicated and committed staff at Áras Laighean are a great source of support and assurance to all and I look forward to your continued professionalism in that regard.

The committees we put in place will be expected to deliver on our objectives and I have every confidence in all of you to deliver and continue the great work of the outgoing committees.

At this stage, I am looking forward to working with all of you in achieving our objectives and targets. Rest assured that I will give this role all that is required and more as I endeavour to repay your confidence in me.

It would be remiss of me not to mention Paddy Flanagan and Cian Murphy and acknowledge the hard work they put into making today a success. Thank you both and big thanks to the hotel staff as well.

We will have our first Council Meeting on the 2nd of March next when we will formally commence our work programme. So we all have a few weeks to 'sharpen the saw' so to speak in preparation.

If you are around tonight you are all very welcome to come celebrate with me in the adjoining golf club from 8 p.m. As it's been a great day for my club, my county and myself on a personal basis, I hope to continue in that vein and have a great night as well.

Changing Landscape for 2018

The 2017 GAA year will be remembered for two Congresses and much change!

The dye is cast and the months of May, June and July will be hectic with all the Inter-County Fixtures in place for the year. The majority of the commentary is focussed on Senior Hurling and Football Championships and the Joe McDonagh Cup. We, ourselves, have introduced significant changes to our Minor, Under 20 Football and Under 21 Hurling competitions.

Both Minor Championships involve League/Knockout format. We are starting approximately four weeks later than in 2017 with the new formats — which include a Shield Competition (K.O.) in Minor Football for counties who finish third and fourth in the respective groups and Hurling teams that do not qualify for the Semi-Finals participate in another competition. With the new lower age group I hope that there no longer will be Player of the Match Awards as I have reservations about putting undue pressure on young players.

With no overlap of players permitted between Under 20 Football and Senior Football, these fixtures can run in tandem. Being of a development nature the Under 20 Football Championship has the potential to be very exciting.

With the addition of Galway and Antrim or Down and that counties can only participate in a Provincial Under 21 Hurling Championship or Richie McElligott Cup we have re-formatted the Championship into a tiered structure. I think it is inevitable that Under 21 Hurling will go to Under 20. Realistically the month of May is not a month for Under 20 or Under 21 fixtures thus limiting both June/July (Football) and June/July/August Under 21 (Hurling).

There is also a significant change to the Provincial Club Championships 2018 i.e. winners on the day including Finals (similar to Under 20 Inter-County Football). As a result with the exception of Junior Hurling Round 1, the AIB Leinster Club Championships 2018 begin on the last weekend in October.

In the overall context of Fixture Planning the use of winner on the day concept in knock out games should be extended to all club games up to and including Under 21, up to and including Quarter-Finals of County Club Championships; all knock out games in subsidiary adult competitions, all knock-out games at juvenile (except, perhaps, Minor Finals) and in the Education Sector.

Refereeing

During 2017 the programme of training referees was intensified. The feedback is very positive - particularly with the facilities at Abbotstown. Next year's programme of games at inter-county, not to mention clubs, will be a challenge for the Council to provide match officials. It is a challenge that will be met with the assistance of the 12 counties positively increasing their own pool of referees and ultimately a greater number making the provincial and higher grades.

We look for more games. We must have more match officials.



Cross-County

Club Cross County Competitions are becoming more popular by the year. This is due in no small means to the Games Development Staff (Provincial and County) who give of their time willingly to answer the call of many clubs seeking additional meaningful games to that provided within their respective counties. The promotion of the said competitions would be greatly enhanced when fixtures once made, change is not negotiable except in the most extreme circumstances.

Coach Education

Coach Education continues to develop and grow. Player Welfare is much talked about presently. It is only right and proper that the welfare of all players is at the forefront of everything we do in the broad spectrum of games activity - all players to get good coaching, game time and respect. This is particularly important at juvenile level to ensure that all are welcome and their experiences are positive.

Likewise it should be similar for youth and adult. Sadly there are occasions when the term player welfare is misused – is it training or playing games that gives rise to real player welfare issues?

Strength and condition (Resistance Training) is a very important component of Player Welfare and Coach Education. Sadly for many either term is associated with weights and gyms. Comhairle Laighean via its staff and volunteers is playing its part in ensuring that Coaches and Mentors involved particularly with juveniles are implementing appropriate programmes - programmes that involve the player's body only.

It is one thing to enable a player to be fit and skilful. It is another matter to keep him injury free. Recent studies involving players have clearly shown that by implementing proper procedures injuries are reduced.

The most productive result is to keep players injury free. Doing the right thing also assists the continued viability of the Player Injury Fund.

East Leinster Project

The East Leinster Project is progressing satisfactorily. Its impact for the years to come will be significant. It is important for all units participating to embrace in a positive manner - asking what they (the units) can do to enhance the project rather than saying what can the project, on its own, do for the units.

Age Grades

Over the past few years concern was raised with the implementation of the policy of clear divide between juvenile (Under 17) and adult. Some may still have concerns – genuine concerns.

That said, we are I believe duty bound to adopt rules to facilitate clubs, particularly clubs where numbers are tight, to field as many adult teams as possible and equally and maybe more important to retain club identity at juvenile level.

Top Oil Post-Primary Schools

Top Oil Leinster Schools Senior 'A' Championships had a new format for the school year 2017 – 2018. There were Football groups of three with a top team qualifying for the knock-out stages while the Hurling was knock out with qualifier system.

Group teams have been a feature of the Corn Ui Dhuill for over 20 years and more recently in the Br. Bosco Cup.

Both with the age change at Minor Inter-County and the constant pressure on Schools, I think it is time for all stake holders to examine the benefits or otherwise of group teams.

In October 2017 the Top Oil Leinster Post Primary S.F. 'A' Cup was named the Br. Bosco Cup. Br. Bosco Mulhare, a proud Laois man, was an outstanding servant to Gaelic Games in the Patrician Brothers schools that he served in — Ballyfin College and Patrician Newbridge to name two of them. It's a fitting tribute to his memory that the Premier Second Level Football Cup in the province is named after him.

The considerable improvement of Club pitches with the addition of County Training Centres has helped in no small way in providing pitches during the school season for school games. The schedule is getting tighter. To keep our players active during the winter it is inevitable that more inter-club competitions (rather than championships) will be played in the winter.

To minimise conflict it is very important that schools adhere to fixture schedule and club competitions are weekend based.

Infrastructure, Safety & Insurance

There has been a significant increase in infrastructure development by clubs over the past year. Numerous clubs requested and received professional advice from members of our Infrastructure Safety & Insurance Committee. A note of caution for all units is to be extremely careful with regard to Gym on site and the usage of same. There is the potential for insurance issues.

Mention of Insurance brings into focus our own Public Liability Insurance. From time to time members query the size of the premium to be paid. The answer is relatively straight forward - all units be vigilant, safety conscious and observe to the full the conditions of the cover. It can be difficult to say no at times, but when there is an incident, I doubt if the unit concerned is told thanks for the obligement.

At county level there are a number of projects being planned. It is essential that prudence is exercised by all counties. Maintenance can often be overlooked when projects are being costed.

Media

The PR and Marketing dimension is expanding all the time. News/comment is instant with the result that demands are greater on personnel in the frontline. 2017 was the first year that a number of match day programmes were produced on our behalf by DBA. In doing so, considerable amount of work in producing the programmes is no longer the task of County PROs' and their respective committees around the province. In fact it is safe to say it would be virtually impossible for volunteers to produce the number of programmes that will be required in 2018 over a short period of time.

The use of a weekend programme proved very successful. The obvious cost saving is noted but, also, the practicality of moving surplus programmes from Saturday game(s) to the Sunday game(s).

Our continued thanks to the media who help us in the on-going promotion of our Games.

Finance

The Financial Report for 2017 shows a considerable improvement on the previous few years – but a word of caution! When analysed, the income increase is primarily due to two games - both our Finals. Sufficient to say that the progress or otherwise of our Counties in the forthcoming Allianz Leagues will be a marker as to how Summer 2018 may pan out for the province.

Governance

Governance is very important at all levels. From time to time we hear of the work load on county/club officials – the vast majority who are volunteers.

Good governance is an important asset in assisting county and club officers in the competent running of the unit(s) they are involved in.



Presently there are training programmes for both county and club officers available. These courses are of great benefit to personnel at the coalface. Issues that are never far from the surface (and in no particular order):

- Properly run AGM
- Club Constitution
- Player Injury Scheme
- Fixtures (including Club/School and County)
- Public Liability
- Health & Safety
- Coach Education
- Club School links
- Refereeing
- Finance
- Data Protection
- · Discipline CCC and Hearings
- · Recruitment of players and officials
- · Club at the centre of the community.
- County Committee 'them and us' and so on.

Yes - the workload is considerable.

Yes - the workload will not get lighter.

Yes – the workload can be shared better.

Sharing increases participation. Aspects of running a county/club in today's world is dictated by legislation and the responsibility that goes with it.

Good communication between club, county and province (both ways) is a vital ingredient.

Good governance in the area of discipline and appeals saves time and frustration for everyone involved. To that end the Leinster Hearings Committee have at times dealt with appeals and a few cases involving infractions which should never have been sought. A small minority yes but both at county, provincial and national level the membership of the various Hearings Committees are volunteers giving of their time to assist in the governance of the Association. They deserve better.

Motion For Congress

Over the past few months, and following up on numerous comments and observations over the past year in particular, the Leinster Management and Finance Committee has proposed that Motions be submitted to Congress in relation to representation at County, Provincial and Central Council and that change be over a period of time i.e.:

- Club representation on County Committee be Club Chairperson or Secretary or Treasurer.
- County delegates on Provincial Council be County Chairman or Secretary and one other.
- County delegate to Ard Chomhairle be County Chairman or Secretary (office holder not on Provincial Council).

At the very least I hope it will generate debate.

Westmeath hero Dessie Dolan is regarded as one of the most inspirational and talented players ever to emerge from the county.

Dolan, who enjoyed a glittering 16-year inter-county senior career with Westmeath, was the star forward on their 1999 All-Ireland U21 winning team, and later their breakthrough Leinster senior football championship winning team of 2004.

He represented Leinster for three inter-provincial cup campaigns, and in 2005 he scored 0-11 when Leinster defeated Ulster by 0-20 to 0-18 after extra time to capture the title in Parnell Park.

He was also picked for five tours of duty with the Ireland International Rules team — which illustrates his ability to perform with the very best of Gaelic football's attacking talents.

Dolan also helped Garrycastle to become the dominant force in Westmeath during his playing days, winning seven senior county titles between 2001 and 2014, and in 2011 won the Leinster SFC Club Championship.

Offaly legend Brian Whelahan - regarded as one of the great hurlers of all time - was inducted into the Leinster GAA Hall of Fame last summer.

He received a standing ovation from the packed stand at O'Moore Park when presented with a memento from Comhairle Laighean Chairman, Jim Bolger, before the Offaly v Galway SHC game.

Brian Whelahan is the only player of the modern era to be selected on the Hurling Team of the Millennium, and won almost every accolade in the game, including All-Ireland SHC medals in 1994 and 1998. He was twice chosen as Texaco Hurler of the Year and received four All-Star awards.

The bigger the occasion, the better he performed, exemplified

by the fact he was chosen as man of the match in two All-Ireland SHC finals, and in three of the All-Ireland Club finals he won with Birr.

Brian's senior inter-county career with Offaly spanned 18 seasons from 1989, when he made his debut against Antrim as a sub during the All-Ireland semi-final, to Saturday, July 8th, 2006 when he played his final game against Clare in the All-Ireland qualifiers at Cusack Park, Ennis.

During that time, he starred in 55 senior inter-county championship games (and 52 NHL games), scoring a championship total of 3 goals and 44 points. He captained the side in 1999, and missed only five championship games due to injury.

Comhairle Laighean 2017 Competition Review

Bord na Móna Leinster GAA Series

Bord na Móna Walsh Cup

IT Carlow proved the surprise of the Tournament in qualifying for the Semi Finals joining Kilkenny, Wexford and Galway – the Big Three. Kilkenny and Galway made it to the Final in Nowlan Park and in front of a large crowd the Cats had two points to spare in a very entertaining game on the first Sunday in February.

Bord na Móna O'Byrne Cup

Despite losing to UCD in Round 2, Dublin joined Kildare Louth and Meath in the Semi Finals. At a packed O'Raghallaigh's, Dublin regained the O'Byrne Cup with six points to spare.

Bord na Móna Kehoe Cup

Three of the seven teams participating were inter-county. Maynooth University and Wicklow were the Finalists with Maynooth University going one better than 2016 and have a nine-point winning margin.

Leinster Under 21 Football Championship (Flood Cup)

Dublin, in retaining the title, are the last winners of the Sean Flood Cup as an Under 21 Championship. They went further and were crowned All Ireland Champions. Westmeath's win in the first round over Meath suggested we would have an interesting Championship. Longford played their part in the Quarter-Final by having 2 points to spare over a fancied Kildare side. Offaly and Laois served up a very entertaining Semi-Final with the Faithful County winning by the minimum. Longford's run came to an end but not before giving the Dubs a run for it.

Leinster Under 21 Hurling Championship (Robbins Cup)

A highlight of the Championship was Westmeath getting 3 games – a comprehensive win over Meath, a three-point extra-time win over Laois and with 10 minutes remaining in their Semi Final were within striking distance of eventual provincial winners – Kilkenny. Wexford overcame a talented Carlow side in the other Semi Final.

Leinster Intermediate Hurling Championship

Two games – two titles. Kilkenny duly won their Leinster game with Wexford and in a very entertaining All-Ireland Final defeated Cork at the new Pairc Uí Chaoimh.

Leinster Minor Hurling Championship (Hanrahan Cup)

Our Minor Championship had a very clear divide between the top three or perhaps four and the rest. The tiered structure is to facilitate counties to have at least 2 games (except the losers on the first day of Tier 3 who heretofore participated in the All Ireland MH 'B' if they wished) at their own level. Sadly, of the first eight games played only four of them had winning margins of 10 points or less. The last five games with one exception were relatively close affairs. When the dust had settled, Kilkenny were Champions - four points the winning margin over Dublin. In the All-Ireland Minor Hurling B Championships, Meath kept the provincial flag flying. It is appropriate that the Peadar Ó Liatháin cup is in the Royal County as Peadar spent many years promoting hurling in his adopted county.

Leinster Minor Football Championship (Murray Cup)

Surviving a first-round scare from Meath, the Dubs went on to regain the Provincial title. Despite their solid performance against Dublin, Meath were unable to progress when, despite having a comfortable lead with 10 minutes remaining, were blitzed by Laois who scored the last six points to win by the minimum in the Qualifier Round. Louth and Wexford provided a novel pairing in the Semi-Final with the Wee County making it to their first Minor Final since 1971. The Semi-Final pairing of Dublin and Kildare was equally entertaining. The more direct style of the Dubs won on the day. Despite Louth's best efforts the Dub's were comfortable winners in the Final.

Leinster Special Under 17 Hurling Competition

Six counties participated in this competition. It was lack-lustre to say the least. That said, the Final gave Dublin the opportunity to get one over on the Cats when winning the Competition by a margin of 10 points.

Leinster Special Under 17 Football Competition

There were a number of exciting games throughout the competition which was run on the same format as the Minor Football Championship. Both Semi-Finals were value for money and both high scoring — Meath defeating Kildare by four points and Dublin getting the better of Laois by two points. The Final was as entertaining as both Semi-Finals with the Royals having five points to spare over the Dubs.

Leinster Senior Hurling Championship (Bob O'Keeffe Cup)

The last usage of the present format (for the present at least) gave us a Summer of great entertainment. The Qualifier section came to life in the middle round when Kerry defeated Westmeath. Meath held their own in two rounds – defeating Kerry by six points and coming within two points of Westmeath. At the end of an action packed Round 3 Laois and Westmeath headed for the Quarter-finals, while Meath headed for Christy Ring but never arrived. Even though Westmeath were the underdogs they came within seconds of upsetting the odds when, in TEG Cusack Park, they were level entering injury time. Semi-Final wins for Wexford and Galway gave us a unique Provincial Final. A crowd of over 60,000 witnessed an enthralling Final. At the end the Bob O'Keeffe Cup was crossing the Shannon for a second time with the Tribesmen.Galway's Summer continued into Autumn winning the Liam McCarthy on the first Sunday in September to add to the Minor title. 2017 was an outstanding year for the Tribesmen winning the three majors on offer – Allianz Hurling League, Leinster and All Ireland titles.

Leinster Senior Football Championship (Delaney Cup)

Dublin duly did the seven in a row – a major achievement in itself. Carlow's performances in both Championship and Qualifier are worth noting. Their four point win over newly promoted Wexford set up a Quarter-Final clash with the Dubs. On a June Saturday evening in Portlaoise they won the hearts of many with a solid performance. They built on their performance to perform well in the Qualifiers, ultimately running Monaghan very close in Netwatch Cullen Park. Meanwhile, Dublin and Kildare qualified for the Provincial Final. The Dubs got off to a flyer with two early goals. Kildare displayed great resolve in overcoming the early set-backs to play their part in a very entertaining Final. The Dubs went on to complete a historic three-in-a-row of All-Ireland titles. Dublin have set the standard – both within and outside the Province.

Leinster Junior Football Championship

Six counties participated. Under new Eligibility Regulations, only Longford, Wexford and Wicklow were allowed to field second best teams. Meath were too good for Louth in the Final.

AIB Club Junior Football Championship

Roller Coaster year for Multyfarnham (Iarmhi). Perhaps there was a message in the drawn County Final - they came from a considerable distance behind Ballinacargy but got the draw and then won the replay. Two months later they were Provincial Champions. Having travelled to Wicklow and Wexford they were in TEG Cusack Park for the decider with neighbouring Offaly's Representatives – Erin Rovers who had home wins over Longford, Kildare and Meath representatives. Unlike their drawn County Final Multyfarnham got off to a flyer and were worthy winners of a very entertaining Final.

AIB Club Junior Hurling Championship

St Mogue's of Fethard and John Lockes of Callan successfully negotiated their respective Quarter-Finals and Semi-Finals to contest the Tommie Murphy Cup. Despite a very strong second half performance from Callan, the Wexford side held on with three points to spare. St. Mogue's followed up their provincial success with a well-earned All-Ireland Quarter-Final win over Br. Pearse's (London).

AIB Club Intermediate Football Championship (Sean Eiffe Cup)

There were a number of exciting games in the Intermediate Championship.

- Two points separated Emo (Laois) and Hollywood (Wicklow).
- Emo and Ballyboughal went to a Replay with a late goal giving the Dublin side a two point win.
- Curraha (Meath) defeated O'Connells (Louth) by 0-01.
- Eventual winners Killanerin (Wexford) had two points to spare over Raheens (Kildare) in Quarter-Final and three points to spare in Semi Final v St Mary's Rochfortbridge (Westmeath).
- · Ballyboughal were one point winners over Curraha in Semi Final.

The Final was close throughout. A late penalty could have brought the Final to extra time but the crossbar intervened – the Wexford side winning by two points.

AIB Club Intermediate Hurling Championship

St Patrick's, Ballyraggett and Glenealy provided an excellent Final in Nowlan Park. For long periods it appeared that a first Provincial Club Hurling title was heading to the Garden County. As the game entered injury time and the sides level, extra-time beckoned, but it was not to be. A late St Patrick's point clinched the title for the Home side.

AIB Leinster Club Senior Hurling Championship (O'Neill Cup)

They came, they saw and they conquered. Cuala join an elite group of Clubs in winning back to back provincial titles. On a nice December Sunday and on an excellent O'Moore Park, in truth, the issue was never in doubt following the Dalkey side's superb start. Perhaps had Kilcormac-Killoughey converted a second half penalty - well struck and well saved - it would have given them an early second half boost. It was not to be and the Dublin side advanced.

AIB Leinster Club Senior Football Championship

Third last Sunday of 2017, O'Moore Park, Portlaoise. An Epic Finish!

Seldom has any year produced the drama that was witnessed in Portlaoise on 17.12.2017 and captured on TG4 and Radio (National and Local). This year's Championship was blown wide open by tea-time of Quarter-Final Sunday – 12.11.2017. Moorefield, Rathnew, St. Loman's and Simonstown Gaels were the four standing. Both Semi-Finals could have went either way. In the end, it was the Kildare and Westmeath champions who were heading to Portlaoise for the Final but only after Mother Nature played her part by delaying the Final by one week.

At half-time Moorefield were to the good. A superb effort from Loman's saw them wipe out a three-point deficit and go six points in front entering five minutes of added time. By the Final whistle Moorefield had hit 1-04 and were Leinster Champions for the second time. Devastation for Loman's. Delight for Moorefield. The last provincial game of the season was an epic played in a great spirit and on an excellent pitch. Entertainment was top drawer and credit to all involved, including the referee and his team.

Footnote:

December 17th was the 68th Day of usage in 2017 in O'Moore Park. On numerous occasions there would be four games on a given day (Cumann na mBunscol over a two-day period at the end of October played 17 Finals). The quality of the pitch is a credit to Colm McEvoy and colleagues.

AIB All-Ireland Club Championships 2017

Leinster Clubs appeared in four of the six All-Ireland Club Finals. Cuala had a historic win in the Senior Hurling with a comprehensive win over Ballyhea. Carrickshock's win was also comprehensive in the Intermediate Hurling Final. Mooncoin came within a whisker of a clean sweep for Leinster, losing by a solitary point. St. Colmcille's of Meath kept the Football Flag flying but, like Mooncoin, lost out by a point.

Second Level Schools - Masita All-Ireland Series

St Peter's of Wexford, Presentation DLS from Bagenalstown and Oaklands College of Dublin were Finalists in three of the five Football titles on offer – unfortunately none were successful. In Hurling, St Kieran's won in both the Junior Hurling and Senior Hurling 'A' winning the former but losing out narrowly in the Senior decider. St Fintans HS Sutton contested the Senior Hurling 'C' decider.

Games Development Report

2017 like every other year proved to be a very active and busy year for the Leinster GAA Games Development Department under the stewardship of our new Chairman Liam O'Neill. This year in tandem with our regular inputs, saw the development of a number of new initiatives which are aimed at giving the player, the coach, the club and the county more support from the Province. The development and delivery of the Leinster GAA Player Pathway in all counties, which guides coaches through a player's development stages with an age appropriate focus will be a very beneficial resource for new and experienced coaches alike. To add to that the Leinster GAA TÚRAS was developed as a guide for all involved in the development of youth players. This serves as a blueprint, which can be followed by academy and club coaches once pitched at the appropriate level. To take things in a different direction and offer more support to those in administration roles in clubs, the Leinster GAA Club Coaching Coordinator Workshops were developed to provide examples of best practice in clubs and how these coordinators should set up their club structures to run more effectively. At the end of the day, all our players are involved in our organisation to play games, so provision of games is a major priority for our department going forward and that is why the Leinster Leagues, club and regional, were established to provide more games at the quieter times of the year.

At this point we would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the hard work of all involved in Coaching and Games throughout the province in each county and in the Leinster offices. This year a number of employees moved on and we would like to wish them the very best of luck in their future endeavours. A special mention to Lester Ryan who finished up with us this year after being part of the team since 1991. Thanks to Lester for all of his outstanding work over the years..

Organisational Development

Organsiationally, 2017 has been a big year for Coaching & Games in the province. Most notably, our total staff numbers in coaching and games has r increased and with introduction of our TURAS programme we have introduced Talent Development Leaders in counties. The latter has created a career path for existing staff.

The biggest area of increase has been on east side of the Province with Louth, Meath, Kildare, Wicklow and Wexford all receiving additional staff numbers to support Urban clubs. Such clubs can field up to 65 teams and cater for up to 11 different primary schools. An example of the challenge was in Ashbourne, where the club camps in July was in competition with 11 other summer camps in the town. The management the project has been taxing but we are pleased by the engagement of the clubs who have met the criteria and committed financially. It's a project that will need on-going attention and support.

We have engaged with other counties too and made appointments where appropriate. The focus with all has been to increase club engagement and to this end you'll read later about programmes available in 2018 to clubs.


Player Pathway (Club Support)

Creating resources to allow our Games Development staff to improve coaching standards around the province was a major focus for Leinster GAA in 2017. Our Player Pathway program aims to educate our club coaches on what is needed for players at all ages along the pathway. The aim of the Leinster GAA Player Pathway Program is to assist clubs to develop and retain a larger volume of players leading to increased numbers of players playing at adult level.

The program consists of a coaching resource card at each of the six stages along the pathway. The front side of the card advises the coaches as to what suitable attributes a player should strive to have at their particular age with the reverse side outlining a suitable coaching session.

The resource incorporates other programs already in existence within coaching & games including Total Playing Performance Model (TPP) and the GAA 15 warm up.

Embedding the Player Pathway in all Leinster Counties


Throughout 2017 counties including Offaly, Wicklow & Westmeath were to the forefront in delivering this new project to clubs throughout the past year. Much has been learned and tweaked along the way and all counties are now set to deliver the program extensively in 2018.

All staff are now familiar with Player Pathway content and all counties have been provided with resources. The coming year will see a huge focus from all staff on these workshops. Crucially the real progress will be the follow up support for those who attend theses workshops, mentoring club coaches to improve standards of players on an ongoing basis.

TURAS – Supporting Talent Academy Coaches to Develop Players



Through an extensive coach education program entitled TURAS, Leinster GAA aim to improve the quality of coaches working with Academy Squads. The program aims to add to our established coach education courses by mentoring Academy Squad coaches on an ongoing basis, challenging them to improve players.

TURAS, the Irish for journey, was purposefully chosen to reflect the journey that is player and coach development. The TURAS programme will challenge coaches to engage in lifelong coach education by providing flexible, context-appropriate, and bespoke opportunities delivered within the coaching environment.



The overarching objective of TURAS is to implement a coherent and consistent coaching and player philosophy within Leinster GAA that supports the long-term development of players and coaches at county, school, and club levels. It recognises that coaching is central to player development and investing in quality, long-term and sustainable coach education will have significant and positive implications on the development of young players.

TURAS aims to ensure a consistency of message about long-term development and coaching philosophy across all levels of the game; club, school and county. It is a set of principles that outline the type of player each county is trying to develop and the coaching process that support this. TURAS recognises that both coaching and player development is a long-term process that requires continuous investment, engagement and communication.

TURAS will have positive outcomes at all levels by bringing more players into clubs and schools (Play the Game), developing thriving and competitive structures in clubs and schools (Stay in the Game), and achieving success at county level (Achieve in the Game).

It is widely recognised that coaches have a preference for informal and self-directed modes of learning. Consequently, it is important that TURAS provides coaches with CPD opportunities (to complement formal coach education) that provide those operating on the Player Pathway with the skills they need (and the ability to refine and reflect on these). Underpinned by the TURAS principles, the establishment of communities of practice within each county as well as peer coaching, mentoring, and facilitated workshops will be the primary focus of TURAS Community of Practice.

Celtic Challenge

Once again in 2017 Leinster counties were an integral part to the success of the Celtic Challenge. All Leinster counties took part in 2017, with a total of 17 teams represented in the competition. Established hurling strongholds of Kilkenny, Dublin & Wexford entered two teams and for the first time this year Kildare & Meath did likewise, a clear indication of the ambitious work being done in both counties.

Carlow county board did an outstanding job hosting the finals day on June 24th in Netwatch Dr Cullen Park with a total of 6 games played on the day.

Cross County Regional Games

This Autumn we ran four blitz days for 13 year olds at centres throughout the province. Each county was asked to invite as many 13 year olds as they liked to come and play in internal centres for a number of weeks before coming to these centres and each county then divided up their players into a number of teams and played



against another county. This has proved a popular Autumn project, as it provides football and hurling for players who aren't involved in competitions still with their clubs at a quieter time of the year. Although only a new addition to the calendar, over four blitz days, 573 players participated on the hurling days and 887 players on the hurling days. We are hoping this can grow in late 2018.

Cross County Leagues 2017

2017 saw the roll out of provincial wide leagues for u13 & u15 football and hurling teams. Having consulted with county boards, they agreed to free up a window in their fixtures calendar until St. Patrick's Day for these age groups, where Leinster GAA could provide leagues for clubs to play outside their county boundaries against teams of similar standards. The interest levels were very high with over 300 teams entered across the four competitions. Each team was to be provided five football games and four hurling games in this period. For the majority of participants this was a success, however there were some teething problems which we are addressing for the new competitions in 2018.

Having played their groups games, all qualifying teams were invited to Abbottstown to the finals days where forty finals were played over the two days. This was an incredible spectacle with 80 teams and over 1600 players filling the fields at the National Games Development Centre.

Kelloggs Cúl Camps

Having thought we hit saturation point in a number of counties in 2016, once again the Kelloggs Cúl Camp numbers increased this year. In total 51,621 children attended Kelloggs Cúl Camps in Leinster, which saw an increase from 46,557 the previous year. Year on year our Coaching & Games staff exceed all expectations and provide a vast amount of children with a wonderfully positive GAA experience during the Summer months.

In a change to our usual time slot, our Croke Park Play & Stay days were run in April of this year. U8 players from various clubs in all Leinster counties got the chance to play in Croke Park over the two days. With Leinster being the only province to provide u8s with the opportunity to play in Croke Park, this allows us have six pitches and twelve teams playing every hour over the two days. In 2017 a total of over 3,500 children played. Special thanks to Dublin and Laois for supplying twenty four young whistlers over the two days. Littlewoods became sponsors this year and provided a gear pack for all participating players which proved a big hit with all clubs involved.

Adult Club Hurling League 2017

In 2017 the Leinster Adult Hurling League ran very smoothly with just one final running behind schedule. The cooperation of the counties in ensuring that the competition was progressed is greatly appreciated and without this the competition would not be as successful as it is. As in previous years the cooperation of the Referee Administrators in providing referees for the fixtures contributed greatly to the success of the competition and is greatly appreciated. We wish to acknowledge the input of Leinster CCC Sub Committee, Leinster Management Committee, Leinster Games Development Committee, Referees Administrators Committee in the running of the 2017 Adult Club Hurling League.

Special word of thanks to Lester Ryan, Tom O'Donnell and Hannah Horan in the Leinster Offices for their assistance in the organisation of the fixtures.

Coach Education

Once again coach education is a key element of what we do in games development. In 2017 we have engaged with coaches in many different formats from community of practices, seminars, workshops, clinics, conferences, mentoring and club visits and all of this supported by the development of resources such as the player pathway cards, talent development booklet etc. and we will strive to continue to provide more of these types of interactions in 2018. However, once again our formal coach education programme is a key method for working with and developing coaches and in 2017 Leinster GAA through its team of full time and volunteer tutors delivered a total of 256 courses over approximately 900 nights. In 2017 as part of our coach education programme in conjunction with the GPA we hosted a coaching seminar for all current and retired county players who have an interest in coaching within the Province. There were over 20 people in attendance on the day which included a panel discussion with Jason Sherlock, Ronan Sweeney and Michael Fennelly, as well as a workshop delivered by Colm Nally and Sean Kelly (Leinster GAA Tutors).

Key Initiative – Roll out of Award 2 Courses

One of the key projects in 2017 was to amend the roll out of the award 2 programme based on feedback from previous courses. The edited format has facilitated more on course practical's that focus on improving both the quality and context of both the delivery and feedback process. Having made the subtle changes to the programme, the feedback from both participants and tutors has been very positive, so much so that we are considering utilising some of the learnings from this into the delivery of the Award 1 courses over the coming months.

Tutor Training and Development

In 2017 a total of 21 new tutors were trained and are now able to begin delivering on courses in their regions over the coming weeks and months, they will be a great addition to the current pool of active tutors throughout the province. Additionally, in 2017 we have updated the new website will all the resources for our tutors in specific section of the website that is password protected and we will continue to add additional resources and information on to the site in the coming weeks and month. We now have over 100 active tutors in the province and the challenge for us as a provincially body is to continue to provide support and assistance to these tutors to ensure that they are both up to date and highly motivated to continue to provide the quality courses that are coaches both value and benefit from.

Key Initiative – Tutor Seminar

Leinster GAA hosed a community of practice seminar for all tutors in the province. The focus of the day was sharing best practice between tutors. The seminar took place in IT Carlow on Saturday the 28th of October from 9:30am to 1:30pm. Over 50 tutors were in attendance and the day involved talks on adult learning principles, sharing of ideas and some up to date research in Gaelic Games that will assist tutors in the delivery of courses.



Supporting Teachers & Students

The role that both primary and secondary school teachers provide in the promotion of our games can never be understated and due to this we, as per previous years, continued to roll out a number of ongoing initiatives such as our primary teacher workshops (24) and teachers summer courses (7). One gap that we had in our support to teachers was in relation to coach education for second level teachers. In most cases these teachers have already engaged in our formal coach education programme but in 2017, based on our strategy of providing a variety of coach education inputs, we decided to host a number of coaching workshops targeted specifically at second level teachers (See key initiative for more details).

In 2017 Leinster GAA once again provided 39 students from around the province with a bursary of €750 to assist them with their third level studies. These students were selected based on their contributions to their colleges and clubs with a focus on those who are actively involved in both administration and coaching within their respective GAA units. I would once again like to thank Pat Lynagh, Michael Hyland, Ciaran Flynn, and Connor O'Shea for their input in the process, as well as acknowledge the work of Hannah Horan in the administration of the scheme.

Key Initiative - Post Primary Teacher Workshop

Leinster Coaching & Games provided 3 workshops specifically targeted at post primary teachers in the province. The workshops took place on Monday 25th of Sept in IT Carlow, Tues Oct 3rd in Faithful Fields, Kilcormac and Thurs Oct 5th in Dunganny and were delivered by Michael Dempsey. In total 72 teachers attended the three workshops. The content was based around "Developing Coaching Expertise" with focus on the importance and impact of coaching styles. The timing of the workshops was unique in that they took place from 5pm to -7pm each evening and this appears to have been well received by the participants.

Referee Education

Leinster GAA Coaching & Games (through, in particular, Emmett Egan) have assisted John Bannon and the Leinster Referees Administration committee in supporting and training the development referees in the province (see report). In addition to this Leinster Coaching and Games decided to focus on giving more clarity and structure to the provision of introductory courses to younger referees to assist in promoting the idea of refereeing to the next generation. As part of this process it was key to standardise the language, terminology and offerings provided in each county when engaging with this cohort. This will allow us to develop the appropriate resources and promote the courses at provincial level.

Key Initiative - Go Games Referee & Young Whistler Courses

Leinster GAA have developed an updated Go Games Referee course for delivery in the province since November 2017. The course was developed by a number of staff members from around the province, Jenny Rispin (Meath), James Heffernan (Westmeath), Tomas Moore (Laois), and Tadhg Fennin (Kildare), and is based on the needs of the target group based on the experiences of the tutors who delivered the previous course. The course now has an online quiz section, a standardized workshop, and a practical assessment, all of which should assist in the training and deployment of go games referees to assist the roll out of go games fixtures in the clubs throughout the province.

Additionally, with the assistance of David Gough, a young whistlers course was developed to target children at primary school level. This course provides a friendly and fun introduction to the role of refereeing and will assist teachers when delivering internal games programmes within schools.

Two days training have taken place where staff members from each county were identified and trained to lead and deliver these programmes within their counties in 2018.

Supporting Clubs

One of the key strategies for games development in 2017 was to increase our support and assistance to clubs throughout the provinces. This included different initiatives across a number of areas, i.e. Club Bua, Club Player Pathway workshops and resources along with the roll out of our recently designed club coaching officer programme. The programme was rolled out commencing in February 2017 with over 230 participants taking part in workshops throughout the province. The feedback from the workshop has been hugely encouraging and has assisted many club coaching officers in identifying their key roles and responsibilities while giving them the tool to assist in prioritizing the key initiatives to develop based on the needs of their individual clubs

Key Initative - Club Coaching Officer Seminar

Based on the success of the club coaching officer workshops we hosted a club coaching officer seminar in Croke Park on December 9th. This was a follow on to our hugely successful club coaching officer course launched earlier in the year. There were over 40 participants in attendance with all counties represented. The day involved talks from Pat Daly, Volunteer Ireland as well as groups sharing sessions and club case studies from Edenderry GAA (Offaly), St Vincents (Longford), St Mullins (Carlow) and Dunderry (Meath). Once again the feedback was very positive with many participant asking to have regular sessions such as this throughout the year to assist club coaching officers in their roles.

IT Carlow - BA in Sports Coaching & Business Management

Leinster GAA continue to work in partnership with IT Carlow in the roll out and delivery of the BA in Sports Coaching & Business Management (GAA). During 2016 a review took place across a number of courses within the college and the following changes have now being implemented across the course in 2017.

- Change of name (Sports Coaching & Business Management GAA)
- Introduction of RT course in 3rd year
- Introduction of Performance Analysis in 1st, 2nd and 3rd Year Coach Education
- Introduction of Coaching Environment in 1st and 2nd Year Coach Education
- Elective introduced for 3rd Years (Award 2 route or Comm unity Coaching route)
- Introduction of Theory based player development class to go alongside original format (Nutrition in 1st year and drugs in sports in 2nd Year)
- Introduction of Tuesday practical session with all 3 years combined
- Block delivery with outside tutors delivering

The benefit of the course is now being felt across the entire province in that 17 of the past students are working in GDO or GDA roles in the province. Having students come through this programme means that they have the skills and qualities required to easily integrate into our coaching and games staff while also bring with them new ideas and skills that they have developed on the course. The students while on the course are also providing additional support to the roll out of games development initiatives within the province, for example, Easter Camp coaching in Carlow & Laois venues, Carlow squads pitch and education days, delivery of camp to children attending special schools within the province.

It would be important to acknowledge the role that Alan Nolan, Emmett Egan and Michael Dempsey have in the coordination and delivery of the GAA elements of the course that are providing graduates of the caliber of those who are now working for not only Leinster GAA but also other units of the association. Also I would like to acknowledge the support of Myles Kelly (Head of Department), Donal McNally (Director of Sport) and David Deniffe (Vice-President of Academic Affairs) for their continued collaboration in the delivery of this programme.



Europe

Leinster GAA in collaboration with Kevin Lenane (European Coaching Officer) and Ben McEntee (European Development Officer), once again provided a significant number of coach education courses throughout Europe. The following courses took place in 2017:

I would like to thank Kevin, Ben and Ger O'Connor as well as the tutors who delivered on these courses, without whom such a large number of courses would not have been achievable. The enthusiasm and dedication of the participants must also be acknowledged, and I would like to wish each of them the best of luck in continuing to develop the game throughout the many clubs and regions in Europe

Staff Training & Development

During 2017 Leinster GAA continued to provide a number of different training and development supports to staff in variety of formats from individual to groups session and from informal training in programmes such as excel right up to support in achieving formal qualification right up to masters level. A sample of some of the training provided to staff includes the following:

- All staff completed coach developer training in conjunction with Coaching Ireland
- Hosted 2 separate staff induction days for new games development staff
- 18 full time staff completed the Leinster GAA Resistance Training Course
- All staff completed an Insurance seminar delivered by Sinead Leavy
- · All staff attended annual in-service day provided by National Games Development
- Games Managers/Lead GDA's trained to deliver club coaching officer workshops
- · Designated staff trained to deliver the Young Whistler and Go Games courses
- · Award 2 Child for new staff
- Tutor Training
- Certificate in Leadership & Management (Gaelic Games)
- MSc in Strength & Conditioning

We had a significant increase in staff during 2017 due to the introduction of the East Leinster Initiative and the challenge going forward will be to continue to meet the training & development needs of both the new and existing staff that is both tailored to meet the needs of the individual as well as the organisation going forward.



Another school year draws to a conclusion! Our annual convention gives us an opportunity to reflect on what has been a busy year, both on and off the field of play. The 2016/17 school year had a number of highlights, while also presenting various challenges during the year.

St Kieran's College made it three in a row, capturing the SH "A" title, with St Peter's Wexford being crowned SF "A" champions. Naas CBS capped off a great year for the school by taking the SH"B" title, while extra time was needed for St Mary's CBS Carlow to land the SF "B" title. Our remaining senior competitions along with our Junior and Juvenile competitions provided their share of drama and excitement also. Similar to last year, we had a number of 'new' winners which is great to see. To all our winners, provincial and regional, I extend congratulations.

At All-Ireland level, despite many a great performance and close call we only saw one All Ireland Title come our province's way, with St Kieran's wining the Junior Hurling "A" title. All schools represented themselves and the province with great distinction. Unfortunately St Kieran's (SH "A"), St Fintan's Sutton (SH "C"), St Peter's Wexford (SF "A"), Pres DSL Bagenalstown (SF "C") and Oakland's CC (SF"D") all came up just short on All Ireland Final Day.

While our fixture schedule was complete, it must be noted that there was a number of challenges throughout the year – some

within our control and others not so much! The weather once again had a major impact on fixtures. A number of venues were unavailable/unplayable up to and including April. This once again showed the value of the various 3G/4G pitches. The availability of Abbotstown as a venue has been invaluable. While some schools/mentors still have reluctance when it comes to 3G pitches, I'm glad to say the majority realise their importance to the fixture administrators!

The teacher strike of 2016/17 also had a major impact on fixtures, with certain schools affected more than others. With the future somewhat unclear, this is something we need to take into consideration when planning for the forthcoming years. The number of walkovers/withdrawals during the year was disappointing to see. While some cases were no fault of anyone, I would encourage all to give careful consideration when entering competitions/deciding on grades etc.

Our games would not be an event but for the venues and officials we use – because of the large programme of Gaelic Games – third level, second level, primary level, hurling, football, camogie, ladies football – it is not always as easy as anticipated to arrange venues and referees. That said, we are indebted to the clubs and county boards who make their facilities available to us, some often at short notice. Without the co-operation of these clubs/county boards we simply would not get our programme of games complete. Thanks to all the teachers and coaches who are helping to keep GAA alive and continuing to grow in our schools. Your time and work is appreciated.

It is important to regularly review our fixtures and formats. It is especially the case now that we are facing into the possibility of new age limits at club (and schools?) competitions. I'm glad to say that Comhairle Iarbhunscoileanna Laighean and Leinster GAA Games Development are actively and regularly reviewing our competition structures etc.

The 2017-2018 School Year will see a change of structure for a number of our competitions. The Senior Football "A" and "B" is moving from straight knock out to groups format while the Senior Hurling "A" will have a 'back-door' route. As well as these changes we have introduced official First Year Hurling & Football Competitions. Hopefully all these changes will help enhance our competition and profile as well as providing much more game time for our students.

The Leinster Tutor Trainer Group's primary role is to ensure delivery of coach education programmes and to maintain quality standards on a continuous basis with all of our tutor corps. Over the past 20 years the group has led out on Coach and Tutor Education across the Province with the result that we now have a comprehensive coach education programme, active in each County, delivered by tutors that have been trained within Leinster.

The Tutor Group also represents the province at national level in the design and implementation of coach and tutor programmes. Representatives of the group are actively involved at present with the other provinces and Croke Park in reviewing the current coach education programme. This review has taken a considerable amount of work and time over the last 12 months and continues at present.

Now ask yourself this, "why I would want to learn more about coaching on a coaching course when 80% of what I will learn I can find on the internet?" This information was relatively difficult to access in the past. Now, all you need is access to a laptop and an internet connection and, all that has limited you in the past, is readily available. However, 'content' knowledge is now no longer the power in coaching. Our courses have placed a greater emphasis on using that content more effectively, with an increase consideration for the 'who', 'how' and 'why' we coach. In addition, these courses provide a community of practice where coaches are encouraged to analyse, reflect and adapt — skills that are central to their continuous personal development.

Coaching by its nature is dynamic and ever evolving. The Leinster Tutor group strive to meet the demands placed by these challenges through education and ongoing support for those who coach our games.

I am honoured to present my first report as Chairman of the Leinster Referee's Committee Leinster Referee Administrator. First off, I would like to thank the respective County Referee Administrators in Leinster, who have worked so closely with me and in particular our Runaí John Bannon. Your advice and support over the last nine months have been invaluable

These are new roles for John and myself and it has been a very steep learning curve but has been made a whole lot easier with the experience of John and the aid of Cathoirleach Jim Bolger, Pat Lynagh and the Leinster CEO Michael Reynolds, Shane Flanagan, Colm Clear as well as the support of the Leinster Council.

To begin, I would like to thank Tom Quigley, Pierce Freaney and Noel O'Donoghue for all their work in the previous committee and for the years of commitment to refereeing. Thanks also to Julie, Patricia and Hannah and all the other staff at Aras Laighean who are vitally important to the Referee Administrators.

In the past number of months, we have instigated a number of new initiatives to help the development of referees in the province which I will deal with them later in the report.

Last year, we began a number of new initiatives with our Development Referees. We started with presentations on fitness and nutrition as well preparation for games in order to better prepare our newer referees for the increasing demands of the role. The training sessions where first run for the Development Referee's in Abbotstown before being made available to the whole Leinster Referee Squad. These sessions have been run on five occasions since November.

I want to thank Leinster Council for arranging these sessions, Coaching and Games for facilitating the sessions and especially Emmet Egan who has been invaluable with his professionalism, support and providing resources to make it all possible.

It is vitally important that we continue to provide the Development Referees and our National Referees the necessary support with education and skills which will allow them to ensure that they have done all they can so they can be ready to referee at National Level.

There have been improvements made to the fitness levels of individual referees and results rules examination from last year. This needs to continue, referee's fitness level is a basic requirement for the role and is the one area where the referee has total control. Referee's should be encouraged to continue to work on their fitness levels and pre-game preparations in order to ensure that they will be ready for whatever the game throws at them. We will continue to provide necessary resources provided that there are tangible results. Individual referees should also honestly ask themselves, if they done all they can to ensure that they can Referee at the highest level.

The Leinster Refereeing academy was not run during 2017 the intention to complete early in the new year with the introduction of a course completely different format. This course is aimed at Referees in the counties, who show potential and would benefit from attending the courses. This is for the benefit of club Referees allow them develop, is really targeted at Referees who may be considered for Provincial panel in a couple of years.

Recruitment continues to be a major issue around the counties and as such a number of questions need to asked of every county board. Have we supported Referees in the county? Have we implemented policies that would attract people to Refereeing? Have we used all the resources we have available, PRO and websites, advertisement in the match programmes?

As an organisation, we need to increase the profile of Refereeing and the importance that they make to the GAA. I believe that more emphasis should be put on the importance of refereeing and the worth of well-trained and well-informed referees. We

should have a section on County websites for Refereeing, where the courses could be advertised, the rules of the games section, the Referee's handbook, and a question and answer section.

It is also important that clubs and counties understand that the standard of Refereeing is directly related to the quality of people that are recruited.

I am aware that there is a reluctance in some counties to appoint new people to Referee the "big games" and as a result fall back on the easier option of going with the tried and trusted person for the job. The difficulty with this policy is that we may lose some of our most promising Referees because they are not getting games or the chance to move up and take charge of the "big games". This policy affects the Provincial Development panel, because the Referees pathway dictates the level of games to be Refereed before been considered for the panel. How do we know if they are good enough unless we test them and find out?

Over the past number of years, the Association has run the campaign Give Respect Get Respect and the importance of this cannot be understated. But what surprises me is the fact that some of the Referee Administrators have indicated that there are have been issues in some Counties where at County Committee meetings there has been discussion in relation to Referees including naming the Referee. Other issues include clubs dictating who is Refereeing their games, if there are problems it is a matter for the Referee Administration Committee, their role is the grading, performance and development of Referees. These issues should be addressed at this forum. The importance of an advisor system in the County would inform the Administration Committee in relation to issues of importance, unless we identify issues we cannot fix them,

If we cannot respect the role and the Referee at this level in the county how can we expect it to be done at a basic level. We all see things in the GAA through the lens of our own clubs or county colours but this does not give us a right to abuse a Referee. Patrons of our games appears to ignore a player missing a 14m free in front of the goals, but feel free to abuse a Referee for giving a free 40m from goals, to which he has a different view to all others in the ground.

There is another major discussion needs to be had in relation to our games, both hurling and football, and that is the implementation of the rules of the game. There appears to be an appetite among supporters, managers, and players in relation to how a Referee should apply the rules. This is becoming constant refrain from the terraces let the game flow we have taken the physicality from the game. The question I want to ask are we telling Referees to ignore the rules of the game, and if we do that what are we creating?

If a player is 6'3" and 15 stone weight and because of his size is capable of bursting through tackles even though he is being fouled, and free is not awarded. What do we do with a player who is 5'8" and 11 stone and is been held and because of his size is not capable of breaking the tackle and free is awarded against him for over carrying. So, do we start rewarding foul play? The question people need to ask themselves do we want a game played by giants or skilful players or do we reward good play and punish foul play? This is a major issue for Refereeing going forward.

With regard to Tutoring which was addressed in last years report by the Chairman Tom Quigley, I am glad to inform the delegates that the Foundation course, which was was re-designed, has been running very successfully with a lot of input being taken on-board from the Administrators and Tutors.

I want to thank the tutors from the province who continue to provide the best tuition for established Referees, for their inservice training, and to those who are just starting out their journey. It should be the case across all counties that if a Referee has not yet completed the in-service training they should not be Refereeing. This should be encouraged as to promote the highest possible standards to referees and not allow their knowledge and skills to lapse.

All Referees should also continue to be members of clubs, complete all their required courses and be garda vetted.

Advisors continue to be a vital cog in the Development of Referees. The advice that is given is designed to provide Referees with guidance, encouragement and criticism to allow them learn from mistakes and how they might improve. I want to thanks all advisors for their work during the year in all weathers and conditions and ensuring the advisors forms are available to Referees and the Fixtures Committee.

Just to conclude my 1st Report to this convention. Having played for my club and county at a high level as well as being involved in coaching for Club and County, I can honestly say that Refereeing is the closest I can get to playing. There are huge positives to be involved in this aspect of the GAA. But it is one that does not appear to be valued at Club level and it is our responsibility to ensure that we have people Refereeing who are motivated and feel valued.

There is no doubt that within Leinster there is a huge interest in refereeing and the value it brings to our games. But it is the responsibility of individual Counties to bring the message to the clubs and to their delegates. The recruitment drive continues for Referees and advisors and contact should be made with the Referees Committee in the Counties. If delegates or County Boards need help or support John and myself are available and do not hesitate to contact us.

A Disciplinary Information evening was held in June which was attended by 72 interested members from almost all of the Leinster counties with main speakers George Cartright from CCCC and Liam Keane CHC sharing their knowledge and experiences with us. The disciplinary process will continue to be a learning module for us all and the more opportunities we allow ourselves to share information the more equipped we can be.

It is now 10 years since the formation of the Hearings Committee in its present format and clubs/players seeking to have a red card rescinded still need to realise that to succeed they require compelling evidence (ie, video in most cases). We would also like to remind our members that all requests for hearing or appeal must be signed in Irish by the appellant.

We still urge all Club officers to acquaint themselves with the Official Guide, see rule 3.1(b) in an effort to best represent their player/club in defending their position in any disciplinary case.

At the recent Leinster Conventions there have been changes to Bye Laws to enlarge Leinster Hearings Committee. It was a great pleasure to welcome all new members on board and we are now well equipped in numbers to hear cases and allow members to step out due to possible conflict in interest.

The committee met on 15 occasions since last Convention. We received 26 Hearing Requests, 3 were ruled out of order, 5 were withdrawn and we heard 18 cases. We received 21 Appeal Requests, 6 were ruled out of order, 1 was withdrawn and we heard 14 cases. We were involved in 2 cases at DRA and 2 with CAC. We brought one of the CAC cases to the DRA..

County Fixtures Programmes

The role of this committee is not to plan or develop a fixtures programme for the province, but rather to analyse how the fixture programme works or in some cases, does not. As the title name suggests, the committee analysed and discussed each county's fixtures programme. It was pleasing to see various members sharing ideas and proposing using shared information in the development of their county fixtures.

It is accepted by now that all counties are working towards the provision of an adequate number of meaningful games on regular basis, at the right time of year. The usual stumbling blocks of dual players, exams, County teams and numerous other considerations have to be factored in to a County plan. It was a topic which was debated at length on many occasions by our committee. The advent of the new "Super 8" structure in football and the round robin series in hurling provided plenty of debate & discussion at meetings. The "window" for club fixtures in April has county fixtures planners scratching heads somewhat, and taking a "wait & see" approach when it comes to county players involvement with clubs. As with the new inter-county championship fixtures, it remains to be seen how fixture planners will approach the new format.

In general, the majority of club competitions were finished in a timely fashion; however the involvement of dual clubs at the business end did prove problematic at times.

The advent of the Under 17 championship was welcomed, however it was broadly accepted that Under 19 club competitions may be problematic in terms of player demands and exam times.

There are a number of challenges on the horizon for the county fixture planner in the year ahead, how these changes will impact on the club competitions can only be measured at the end of 2018.

At underage level, the growth of the inter county leagues has benefit clubs greatly in prolonging their games programme and introducing a new level of competition for clubs. This has so far been a great success and should be encouraged to grow and develop.

GAA Competitions Management System

Each of the Fixtures planners were invited to a training days in Croke Park. The focus of this training was on the GAA Competitions Management System reporting programme (For Fixtures Planners Reports). The training days proved very beneficial. Tutoring was carried out by Bernard Smith (Croke Park). Online training programmes are also in place for the benefit of the Fixtures Planners.



The role of the County fixtures planner is gradually becoming more recognised and accepted within the Counties. Counties that have embraced the position and are reaping the benefits of insightful reports in relation to the County fixtures programme, the new template will provide further ammunition for the planning of fixtures, particularly into 2018 & 2019.

A new template has been developed by Bernard, and demonstrated at our most recent meeting. It is expected that the accurate input of data and information from the county fixtures planners, will give valuable feedback for the years ahead.

Committee Observations/Recommendations

Providing the perfect games programme that fits the requirements of every stakeholder is probably unattainable, however working toward that ideal will bring incremental improvements that will uniformly improve games programmes across the board. CCC's and Fixtures Review committees should endeavour make informed decisions regarding competition structures. It is recommended that lessons learned from the last number of years from the varied operation of the Fixtures Planners should be examined to determine the best way forward for the role.

The Committee has met on a number of occasions in 2017 with a focus on developing a number of new initiatives linked with the GAA's Club Leadership Development Programme (CLDP). The Committee works with the National Officer Development Committee (NODC) and in particular Ruairí Harvey and Emmet Haughian in Planning and Training in Croke Park.

The stated aim of the CLDP is to provide the principal GAA Club Officers - Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, PRO - with the basic knowledge and core leadership skills required to fulfil their roles effectively. The Committee has been involved in identifying and supporting associates in the province with the intended aim of rolling out this programme more fully in 2018. A key initiative undertaken was the development and piloting of the Pre-AGM module in Counties Meath, Kildare and Carlow. This module supports the club officers in planning, running and following the AGM. Its presentation to over 120 club officers in October 2017 was met with a very positive response and will be rolled out further in 2018. It is also planned to deliver other modules in the CLDP in 2018 including the module on IT. The Committee has also linked with the European County Board with the intention of delivering via webinar modules from the CLDP.

The Committee actively supports Club Planning and will be involved in facilitating this further in 2018.

The Committee welcomed the Club Bua initiative rollout by Comhairle Laighean.

The Committee in planning for 2018 will alongside the Club Planning and Leadership Development training and Club Facilitation aim to support:

- · sharing of challenges and solutions amongst clubs
- supporting communities of club officers with clear steps to dealing with issues
- encouraging involvement and giving ideas to clubs to identify, develop, support and retain officers

As Chairperson, it gives me great pleasure to present my annual report to Leinster Convention 2017.

2017 was a busy year for this committee as they continued the trend set from previous years. The Committee's responsibilities for 2017 included; assisting and supporting Clubs & Counties with their Club Physical Development(s) including Grant Applications, Strategic Club Planning Programmes, Land Acquisitions and facilitating Safety Inspections & Insurance queries.

In excess of one hundred Clubs shared a total of \le 887,800 in Development Grants, with Ard Chomhairle contributing \le 750,000 and to ensure the percentage set from previous years was maintained, Comhairle Laighean contributed \le 137,800. Educational entities shared a total of \le 45,000.

As in previous years the trend continued with Clubs seeking to purchase land to provide additional playing facilities. A number of Clubs completed transactions during 2017, with a large number of developments still in progress. In the main, the Association fortunately is acquiring such land at agricultural values however, it may be the perception that a small number of clubs have paid over the odds. For a variety of reasons including identity and economy of scale, it must be emphasied that purchasing additional land adjacent to a Club's present facilities is preferable to having to purchase elsewhere.

With the number and scale of developments increasing in recent years and likewise anticipated for the coming year(s) within our clubs and Counties throughout the Province, our allocation of funding is falling short of expectation. We feel the time has come that an additional allocation of capital provided to the Province is a necessity. We will certainly be putting forward a strong business case again in 2018 for extra funding to allow us continue assisting clubs with their development of facilities which are deemed necessary, fit for purpose and value for money.

On this note, members of our committee are in the final stages of drafting a guide 'Contractors Suppliers List' which is aimed to help clubs achieve continuity with and projects which are economically viable. The process therefore has more than one objective such as the evaluation of the competence, the ability in terms of skill, knowledge and awareness to perform within a purpose to specified standards and costings.

Some major projects were completed during the year and many others commenced, the highlight for me was in Offaly and great credit to all involved when they opened their Centre of Excellence, 'The Faithful Fields' on the main N52 just outside Kilcormac.

Laois have completed remedial works in O 'Moore Park Stadium and are in the final stages of completing their adjoining Centre of Excellence. Kildare GAA is also progressing with their redevelopment of St Conleth's Park in Newbridge. Pearse Park in Longford has also turned a corner as planning permission was recently approved allowing safety works commence on their stand, completion date anticipated in time for their Leinster ¼ final fixture against Meath next May.

Although this will require significant financial resources to rebuild to the required standards, on reflection the professionalism demonstrated by Coiste Longfoirt in dealing with a potentially very dangerous situation is to be commended and tribute must

be paid to all involved. We also visited other Counties that have plans in place for their forthcoming projects in 2018 and we endeavour to continue providing support and advice in relation to same.

Overall it has been a busy year with development throughout the Province and from reviewing the allocation of the recent Sports Capital Funding; hopefully 2018 will also be a productive and rewarding year for all involved.

Our safety personnel had another busy year, as they continue to carry out general safety inspections in many Counties. As host Counties for Feile 2017, particular focus was in Counties Carlow, Wexford and Kilkenny. Close on 50 inspections were carried out by our committee members prior to the hosting of these games. Great credit to all involved and it was evident in most clubs that safety is to the fore. However, we highlighted some serious faults in a small number of grounds where immediate action was required and a follow up visits are planned for this coming year. Furthermore, our safety personnel will be visiting all Counties in the coming months with the view of delivering safety workshops and information sessions.

We have set the trend for the rest of the Country addressing safety issues at Féile venues and our safety checklist is now the template for other Counties across the provinces. Our vision now is to further enhance this initiative and help clubs and Counties promote a safety culture within their respective grounds and try getting all relevant personnel to value safety. It is in our own interest as an organisation to ensure that all units operate to the highest standards and while we tend to focus on the 'bigger games' it is important that we are Safety conscious at all levels.

From an Insurance perspective our Association faces ongoing challenges; from the Legal System in Ireland i.e. Notification period of 2 years, Award levels, the GAA's broad spread of locations, facilities & activities and the increasing engagement in Non-Core activity & facilities that support Non GAA Activity - We do a lot more than just Play Gaelic Games.

Although we commend and promote the development of our facilities that support our own activities, it must be acknowledged that our facilities also support Non GAA activity which is sometimes seen as a potential revenue stream. However, risk exposure is increased when Non GAA users are permitted access to our facilities and our Grounds.

Claims experience highlight we are failing to adequately manage facilities and activities adequately e.g.

- · H&S statements insufficient or non-existent
- · Recording keeping limited or non-existent
- Not requesting Proof of Insurance from Users
- · Limited if any paper trail
- · No Provision for Maintenance / Upkeep or Replacement

In Court – If It's Not Written It Didn't Happen.

The Associations Liability claims experience sees cost & numbers of incidents rising annually. It is believed that weakness in management of facilities & activities is a contributing factor. This worrying trend is threatening the future of our Association's ability to attain adequate insurance cover.

As a result our Liability Insurance fund loss of €700k in 2016 followed a loss of €700k in 2015. Pre 2015 €1.5m premium increase was absorbed by the fund which was not passed on to clubs.

Going forward our Insurance personnel from our committee will be largely teaming up with our safety team as part of delivering workshops and information sessions to all Counties. It is hoped that by communicating with and supporting clubs to this end will gradually reverse this alarming trend. I would strongly encourage all personnel to take ownership.

Special thanks to P.J., Mick, Aidan and Eamonn on the safety side of this committee. Also thanks to Dave, Joe, PJ, Bill, Pat and Joe on the infrastructure side and to the two Padraic's from an insurance perspective. As volunteers they all carried out their tasks in a professional manner and each and every one of them are a major asset to our Association.

Many thanks also to Michael Reynolds and staff at Aras Laighean who always provided our committee with excellent support, efficiency and were always available to help out.

A special thanks to our Cathaoirleach Jim Bolger and his Management team for their support and wise advice throughout the year and I look forward to working with everyone again for the coming year.

"Games for All" has gone from strength to strength over the past three years, with an excellent uptake in participation levels. The energy and creativity expended in engaging with our Coaching department as well as Local Sports Partnerships, Irish Wheelchair Associations and the Irish Special Schools Sports Council (ISSSC) has paid dividends and catapulted our "Games" to a very exciting level.

The principal components being; Wheelchair hurling, Disability football and Respect Initiative.

Wheelchair Hurling

Wheelchair hurling facilitates those with disabilities to fully participate in GAA games and opens our games to people of all abilities. This ethos is part of the GAA's wider inclusion strategy which states that disability is not a barrier to sport. It's a sport that contains all of the skill, bravery and stamina of its on-field counterpart while also being able to impressively manoeuvre a wheelchair.

Hubs rather than Clubs are evolving within the province, with a steady uptake of players and involvement of volunteers. Training takes place in the community hall in Vicarstown, Co Laois (new Hub) on a regular basis.

As a game it is growing in popularity and we have some of the best exponents of the art of Wheelchair Hurling competing in the various venues throughout the four Provinces.

Our aim is to have a provincial wide representative from every county on the Leinster panel, and possibly in time a second Leinster team.

In partnership with Louth Local Sports Partnership and Irish Wheelchair Association we provided coaching in Muirhevnamore sports centre, Dundalk, for all ages. Unfortunately a similar coaching session planned for Drogheda in July had to be cancelled due to the local water crisis.

We had the official launch of the rules of Wheelchair Hurling by Aogan Ó Fearghail in Croke Park following a number of reviews.

Success

The team has just completed a clean sweep of the League and Championship. The team finished the campaigns unbeaten, picking up a number of All Star and player of the year awards, also. They continue to improve and are a very committed unit with great levels of skill.

It is heartening to see the encouragement and support of their families as they compete.

Disability Football (Games for All Football)

Throughout the four Provinces coaching has been taking place with the support of county Coaching staff and teachers in the many Irish Special Schools Sports Council (ISSSC) schools. The council is a voluntary organisation which provides sporting and cultural activities in schools, designated by the Department of Education and Science for pupils with mild general learning disabilities. Following a meeting of "Leinster Games for All" committee in 2015 the idea of a football tournament in Croke Park was mooted. This was acted upon at National level and through much collaboration with the Irish Special Schools Sports Council (ISSSC) and the GAA a fixture plan was implemented

On Monday September 26th 2016, students from the ISSSC competed in Croke Park for the first time. Again this September, 130 players, boys and girls from Connacht, Dublin, Munster, North & South Leinster and Ulster represented their schools. This now has been scheduled in as an annual fixture.

Respect Initiative - 'Give Respect Get Respect'

Our target in Leinster is to have the "Give Respect – Get Respect" sign with the club crest on it, erected at the entry to all our club grounds.

In a time when racial abuse rises its head in our field games, when the Social Inclusion and Integration of all Ethnic Minorities, travellers, and respect for match officials is of the utmost importance to our great organisation the placing of this sign will help spread our message.

New Arrivals

The 2017 season saw a changing of the guard with the end of Pat Teehan's excellent three-year term in charge as Leinster GAA PRO and he was succeeded by the experienced former Meath PRO Martin O'Halloran. Martin has extensive GAA and media experience which will be of great benefit to him in his role.

A new Communications & Marketing Committee was put together by Leinster Chairman Jim Bolger which is packed full of expertise in this field. The new committee is: M O'Halloran (Cathaoirleach), Cian Murphy (Runaí), Brendan Minnock (Offaly), Mary Foley (Wexford), Wayne Byrne (Carlow), Bob Doheny (Louth), Tom McLoughlin (Meath), Liam Holton (Meath), Jim Fennelly (Kilkenny), Paddy Darcy (Kildare).

New Website

The Council oversaw the revamp and unveiling of a new and improved leinstergaa.ie website. It was produced by Laird Design, based in Omagh and who for many years were involved with excellent work on behalf of the Ulster Council. Both Munster and Connacht Councils followed Leinster by also moving to work with Laird - who also look after the websites for Kildare and Offaly County Boards. There are plans to expand the reach of the Leinster website in 2018 – particularly in the area of promotional and educational video content.

Social Media

The changing landscape of media consumption continues at a frightening pace, and demanding that, like our Counties, the Province reacts to this change in how information is shared and viewed. The 2017 season was another one of solid progress in terms of growing that audience primarily across Facebook and Twitter with more followers than ever before. We invested more financial resources in our social media outputs than in previous years and this helped with results.

Green Flag

One of the great PR initiatives of the last 12 months has been the production of our quarterly ezine *Green Flag* which chronicles the work done by the Province across so many areas. Much credit is due to designer Mark Dignam of knockoutgraphics and chief contributor Brendan Minnock for the work done on this excellent production. It is distributed by email to all clubs in Leinster, all Leinster GAA Committees and Sub Committees and sits in a designated section on leinstergaa.ie. We'd encourage people to engage with it and help with content creation as we look to celebrate and chart the GAA promotional work taking place across Leinster.

Go Games Promotion

Without fail, one of the best promotional days enjoyed by Comhairle Laighean every year is the annual two-day Go Games activity event at Croke Park. In the last 10 years the Council has enabled 30,000 Under 8 children from Clubs across Leinster to experience the thrill of getting to play on the hallowed turf of Croke Park, with family and friends cheering on from the stands. Croke Park is the GAA's greatest promotional asset and enormous credit is due to the visionary decision in Comhairle Laighean Coaching and Games to target this age group - as it really offers us a great opportunity to capture hearts and minds by throwing the doors open to this prestigious setting to young players starting out on their GAA journey. Over the course of April 10 & 11 in 2017 there were 98 games involving 129 clubs representing all 12 counties and more than 3,000 players aged U8 involved.

This year we used a special promotional budget of €5,000 to make sure the 3,000+ children also went home with Leinster GAA promotional material, GAA stickers and pencil cases. They also received a free jersey from national event sponsors Littlewoods Ireland.

In 2017, we also decided to target all of those children from counties who were playing in the first round of the Leinster SFC by also sending them home with a match ticket to their county's opening game. This was done in the hope that they would encourage their parents and guardians to bring them. Sincere thanks is due to Patricia Clear in Áras Laighean for helping to coordinate this initiative of more than 1,000 tickets being distributed by hand on the day. Clearly, more work needs to be done to improve attendances in the early stages of the Championship and this is an initiative worth pursuing further.

Match Programmes

In 2017, we entered into a trial agreement with Match Programme producers and distributors DBA to be the agents for Leinster GAA in our senior championships. DBA hold the national contract for this work with Croke Park, while also having a similar arrangement with Comhairle Connachta.

The reasons for this move were:

- To provide a uniform look, feel and quality to the match programmes in our flagship competitions.
- To ease the burden on county PROs by freeing them of the time and cost involved in match programme production many of which traditionally struggle to cover their costs.
- To enable counties to still enjoy a financial dividend through a sales commission.

This was a significant move by Comhairle Laighean as it meant the Council absorbing all of the production costs involved in more than 20 Championship match programmes. This would not have been possible to do on the existing staff arrangements in the Council and required the project to be outsourced.

However, it was a successful trial that returned a final profit of more than €70,000 to the Council.

Our intention is to enable DBA to work closely with host venues and ensure that the best programme selling system is in place to maximise the potential for the host county and the Council.

Counties continue to produce programmes at club championship and underage competitions and for many it is a labour of love reflected in fantastic productions.

Championship Promotion

The Council was represented by C Murphy at two meetings in Croke Park to work on Championship Marketing and Promotion in the countdown to summer.

The 2017 summer was headlined by a record breaking crowd of more than 60,000 at the Leinster hurling final between Galway and Wexford, while another crowd in excess of 60,000 attended the Dublin v Kildare Leinster football final.

Extensive campaigns for local radio and print as well as on line were in place to fan the flames of enthusiasm and anticipation which were caused by Wexford's great run and also a very popular football final between two Division 1 counties.


The Championships had received another hugely successful and well-attended media launch in May held in the Pearse Museum in Rathfarnham in Dublin. What again proved very popular was the video preview work captured at this launch and used online over subsequent weeks and months.


There were radio and social media campaigns right throughout the summer which helped keep Leinster matches in the spotlight. The 2017 campaign was about putting the Championship 'at the heart of your summer' and is a theme worth pursuing as we seek to get more people to re-engage with the drama, colour, excitement and experience of being part of a GAA Championship day out.

Pearse Medal and Media Awards

The second year of the Pearse medal for the footballer and hurler of the year in Leinster took place in December in Croke Park with Galway's Conor Cooney and Dublin's James McCarthy the winners. The same lunch also honoured Christine Murray (Kildare PRO) as County PRO of the Year in recognition of the great strides they have made in their social media work with Kildare clubs. Louth PRO Bob Doheny was awarded for the County Final Programme of the year – a mighty publication that also contained an excellent tribute to the anniversary of the Louth All-Ireland winners of 1957. Mary Foley represented Buffers Alley who were the Club Website of the Year winners.

Beko Club Bua Award

The 2017 year also welcomed another new sponsor and initiative in the form of the Leinster GAA Beko Club Bua Award. On the back of a hugely successful media launch in April attended by Dublin footballer Diarmuid Connolly and Kilkenny hurler Cillian Buckley, this new scheme has been devised by Comhairle Laighean's Shane Flanagan and seeks to recognise and reward clubs engaged in best practice on and off the field. There were 24 clubs from across the Province who were selected and who shared in a prize fund of more than €40,000 of equipment from O'Neill's.

The scheme will be held again in 2018 and will be enhanced to include a new section honouring the best Club Team Coaches. Our thanks is due to Beko Ireland for their support.

Sponsorships

Bord na Móna sponsored our Leinster GAA Series for the O'Byrne, Walsh and Kehoe Cups in January which attracted big crowds as fans warmed up for the new season. These competitions are called the Accident Tournaments and used by Comhairle Laighean to establish a hardship fund for GAA members in need of special assistance and the on-going support of Bord na Móna is greatly appreciated.

Top Oil are into the second year of their backing of our Post Primary School competitions. This hugely important sector features more than 240 schools and in excess of 1500 matches. The finals were well attended, well-publicised and there was great coverage of the launch and draw for the 2017/18 competitions which are nearing completion in the New Year. We hope we can extend this partnership further.

County Support

Throughout the year there is support, advice and assistance given to counties who seek our aid in the area of Public Relations, Media Management and Communications Guidance. A number of counties had difficulty filling the position of PRO (as do many clubs) – which is a reflection of the demands which exist on a job that has grown out of all proportion in the last 20 years.

Conclusion

This has been another exceptionally busy and rewarding year for our Communications and Marketing team. It is vitally important that we continue to invest in the marketing and promotion of our Games at all levels. These are record breaking times with more people than ever before involved in playing our Games at juvenile level. The responsibility to keep these young people engaged and interested in the GAA is crucial. Our new committee only took office in March of 2017 and it is hoped they can have an even bigger impact on our promotional affairs in 2018.

There were 234 adult entries in 2017 down from 248 in 2016. 11 Counties had players in the championship, Kilkenny leading the way with 61 entries followed closely by Wexford with 52 entries.

In the 2017 Leinster GAA Handball 60-30 Championship Wexford led the way winning 13 Titles followed by Kilkenny winning 11 and huge achievement for Offaly winning 7 titles. 9 counties won adult titles but no success in Louth. More of concern is the lack of 60-30 players from Laois and Longford not entering the 60-30 Championship.
